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
MAURITIUS Introduction

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MAURITIUS Foreword

by David Feldman

If ever an international poll was held to find out which country is the most well known and famous in the whole field of philately it is certain that Mauritius would top the list. Not only to the most knowledgeable inner circles of connoisseur philatelists but to the general public who have perhaps never heard of anything but the "Blue Mauritius" (ref. 1847 Twopence blue) or "Blue Penny" as it is fondly referred to in the island itself.

Both the postal history and stamp issues of this little island in the Indian Ocean have, from the earliest times, held an inestimable fascination for collectors. All the greatest and most renowned philatelists of the past – Henry J. Duveen, Arthur Hind, Count Philip la Renotière von Ferrary, T. K. Tapling, G. H. Worthington, King George V of Great Britain, Czar Nicholas II of Russia, Alfred Lichtenstein, Maurice Burrus, Alfred Caspary, Louise Boyd-Dale and so on, have been drawn to the philatelic romance of this island in the sun.

The attraction is not without reason. Mauritius was the fourth country in the world (with the United States) to issue postage stamps. But it was the first British Colony, and the only country in the world to issue such an outstandingly



beautiful range of valuable primitive first issue stamps. There are five in all, intimately identified by their platemakers - Barnard for the "Post Office" and "Post Paid" followed by Lapirot, Sherwin and Dardenne.

The stories about the creation and production, issue, sale and discovery of great rarities amongst these issues have been prolific in the philatelic and world press for over one hundred years. Still today not one year goes by without some important publication, major article and/or event about these rare and romantic issues. They continually present the reader with some of the most exciting stories that exist in the stamp world.

The postal history is wide and varied – a study which deals with the mails from Europe to the East and back again reflecting the history, economics and commerce of the whole region.

Probably the most significant single attraction has been the VALUE of its stamps – always and universally considered as the most expensive and elusive stamps in the world, the ultimate items in philately.

It is therefore no surprise that one of the most ambitious collectors of the latest generation, Hiroyuki Kanai of Osaka, Japan, wishing to form the most outstanding stamp collection of all time chose Mauritius as the subject. The collection, formed over a period of forty years and sparing no expense, is now presented for auction sale. This catalogue includes his entire collection which changed hands in 1988 and bears witness to the achievement of his goal.

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Description, Presentation and Authenticity of Lots

David Feldman SA guarantees the authenticity of all lots as described in this auction catalogue (see Conditions of Sale Para 4.4).

The Mauritius Classic stamps, specifically the first five primitive issues, have always presented a great challenge for both classification and identification. In view of the volume and value of this auction offer, no doubt the most important offer of any single auction catalogue to date, and Mauritius in particular, we decided to do something of historical and lasting philatelic significance.

By coincidence just at this time Amold Rudge and Douglas Davies were just arriving to near completion of their lifetime study of the Post Paid, Lapirot and Dardenne issues being partly published by the Royal Philatelic Society. With the great assistance given by the use of all the material in our hands they were able to complete this work which is due to be published shortly. In the meantime we could take full advantage to reproduce relevant information from this invaluable reference.

More importantly, all the stamps presented in this catalogue from the Post Paid, Lapirot, Sherwin and Dardenne issues have been classified and plated by Arnold Rudge following careful scrutiny of each individual stamp.

For determining the quality and condition we have had the invaluable assistance of David MacDonnell, together with the expertise opinions given on certificates as mentioned and where we felt it was necessary – Peter Holcombe, Roger Calves, and earlier certificates from R.P.S., B.P.A., Philatelic Foundation, etc.

We believe that the description, classification, platings and expertise in respect of the Mauritius primitive issues is the best that has yet been made. This work has been made in order to give all buyers maximum confidence for the items they wish to purchase. We are, of course, pleased to grant extensions for further expertise or examination should these be requested according to our sale conditions.

Mauritius Quality

The paper and inks used for the 1847 "Post Office" and 1848 "Post Paid" earliest impressions are remarkably similar. The paper is very stout and granular, and when impressed with the intense "oil-paint" globular inks used, creates the excellent full relief which is the hallmark of the best recess-printing. Occasionally the globular nature of the inks is seen in the so-called "sticky prints" of the earliest stamps, where parts have congealed and not adhered to the paper. This is a feature of these issues, and it will be noted that for the later issues, use of a paper of thinner and more delicate nature became normal.

The papers became gradually more fragile up to the Lapirots and Sherwins. These later stamps normally exhibit irregularities in the paper which can often be mistaken for defects. The Kanai collection contains the best known quality for each issue, and in this respect is far superior to any previous gathering of these rare primitives.

Note: A SUPPLEMENT booklet is published and included with each catalogue. This supplement provides details including over 150 tabular charts for the classification of the primitive issues as created by Arnold Rudge and used as the reference base for the items in this catalogue. Douglas Davies contributed the "corner ornament" guide to plating the "Lapirot".

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Most of the greatest collectors in the past owe their fame to the volume, quality and rarity of what they acquired in their collecting lifetime. Rarities of Mauritius probably contributed more to this fame and reputation than any other single area or section, especially the Post Office stamps.

The following is a short description of the world's most well-known and famous philatelists who have also owned important Mauritius items:



W. A. S. Westoby (1815-1899)

One of the leading early English collectors. Began in Paris, in 1862. Co-authored the "The Postage and Telegraph Stamps of Great Britain" in 1881. Sold all his collection, with the exception of Great Britain, to Tapling in 1884.

E. Lalanne

Early French collector who had acquired 1d and 2d "Post Office" through Mme Borchard. Loaned the stamps to Legrand (through Moens) during Legrand's study to prove them not an error on the "Post Paid" plate of twelve. Sold his collection to P. Lataudie for 60,000 francs in 1893.



Sir Daniel Cooper, Bart (1821-1902)

First president of the Philatelic Society of London (later the Royal Philatelic Society, London). Held this position until 1878, at which time he also sold his collection to Ferrary for £3,000.

Baron Arthur de Rothschild (1852-1903)

He began collecting "postal vignettes" very seriously already when at college. Co-founder of the Société Française de Timbrologie. Wrote the "History of the Posts" in 1873. Paid 1,000 francs to J.-B. Moens for a 1d and 2d "Post Office" in 1870. Ferrary bought Rothschild's collection intact for 140,000 francs in 1893.






W. E. Image (1807-1903)

Pioneer English collector, started in 1859 with Cape Triangulars. Sold his entire collection to Tapling in 1882 for £3,000. This formed the basis of the Tapling collection and included all the rarities, with the exception of the 1d and 2d "Post Office". Image had, to his later regret, turned down these two stamps at £240.

Judge Frederick Adolphus Philbrick (1835-1910)

Founder member of the (Royal) Philatelic Society. Amassed a collection of legendary magnitude. Bought in 1865 the entire collection of the Frenchman Georges Herpin for 10,000 francs (Herpin was the inventor, in 1864, of the word "philately"). Co-authored with Westoby "The Postage and Telegraph Stamps of Great Britain". Loaned both his 1d and 2d "Post Office" to Legrand for the 1869 study to prove them not an error on the "Post Paid" plate of twelve. Sold his collection (over 100 volumes) to Ferrary for £8,000 in 1882.



The Brothers Caillebotte (1848-1904)

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Martial (a musician) and Georges (an artist). Possessors of a great fortune, amassed one of the largest collections ever formed, running to more than fifty volumes. Began in Paris in 1877, but after the marriage of Martial in 1887, Georges felt unable to carry on the collection single-handed. The collection contained all the rarities except the 1d and 2d "Post Office" as they had difficulty in agreeing together on the price. Georges much regretted this later. The collection was sold intact to Tapling in 1887 for 100,000 francs, though this transaction was later reported to be £5,000 in 1890.

Thomas Keay Tapling (1855-1891)

Probably the most acquisitive of the advanced early English collectors. Was Vice-President of the London Philatelic Society. Formed what was regarded as the second greatest (after Ferrary) collection in the world. Died in 1891 (aged only 36) and bequeathed his entire collection to the British Museum, which handed them over to the British Library. His 1d and 2d "Post Office" are exhibited there.



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Dr. Jacques A. Legrand (1820-1912)

Pioneer of scientific philately, Legrand wrote under the pseudonym "Dr. Magnus" and invented the perforation gauge. Published "Manuel Amateur des Timbres" in 1894. Co-founder of the Société Française de Timbrologie. Bought 1d and 2d "Post Office" from J.-B. Moens. Made the first recorded reconstruction of the "Post Paid" in 1869, and conclusively proved that the "Post Office" stamps were printed from a different plate. Sold his collection to Th. Lemaire in 1897.

Sir William Beiby Avery, Bart (1853-1908)

Chairman of the famous Birmingham firm of W. & T. Avery, makers of weighing scales, he was a serious collector already in 1882. At the turn of the century his collection of All World was reputed to be one of "the largest and finest existing". He owned three Mauritius "Post Office" including the unused 1d and 2d which he bought from Stanley Gibbons from their famous advertisement. Also included in this monumental section was a splendid array of "Post Paid" stamps including three grand "Earliest", one being an incomparable example of the "PENOE" error. He also made a number of reconstructions of the 2d stamp. Parts of his collection were sold to W. H. Peckitt, the London dealer, and Henry Duveen after his death.





Frederick Breitfuss (1851-1911)

Formed in St. Petersburg the third greatest general collection (after Ferrary and Tapling). Joined the (Royal) Philatelic Society in 1874. Collection sold intact to Stanley Gibbons Ltd., in 1907.

John F. Seybold (1858-1909)

Settled in Syracuse, New York of German origin, he was one of the first to put together a major world postal history collection which earned him the title "The Father of Postal History". Amongst his most prized items were a pair of Post Paid on cover and an even more precious pair of Sherwins on cover. He committed suicide at 51 years old apparently as a consequence of the revelation of his homosexuality in a prudish post-Victorian America. His collection was sold in a series of three auctions by J. C. Morgenthau. Many of the covers once in his collection bear a violet handstamp or signature in pencil of Seybold on reverse.





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Baron Phillip de la Renotière von Ferrary (1858-1917)

Formed the greatest collection ever seen. Besides being one of the most prodigious philatelists ever, he was known as "eccentric par excellence". His mother, who inherited a fortune of over 200 millions from her late husband, was rich to the tune of about 100 millions in her own right. She would accompany her son down the rue des Canettes in Paris to visit dealer Pierre Mahé in the mid 1860's. Fortunately Mahé helped enormously to develop the collection and mount and classify the purchases "in bulk" which Ferrary would throw into boxes from all the pockets of his suit! He was also known to soak many stamps off their original

envelopes. Neither did he care for pairs or blocks but preferred to have the choicest single mint examples available for each issue. He died in 1917, bequething his collection to the Berlin Museum, but claims for war reparations against the German nation prevented his wishes being carried out. Collection sequestered by the French Government and sold by auction 1921-1925 and 1929. Included both unused and used of each 1d and 2d "Post Office".

Henry J. Duveen (1854-1919)

Art and antique dealer in the U.S.A., uncle of the infamous Sir Joseph Duveen who was one of world's greatest ever dealer in important paintings. "Uncle Henry" had an acquisitive taste for rare and valuable stamps. Amassed a general collection of exceptional depth and quality, which was valued, at the time of his death in 1919, at \$5 million. Owned during his collecting life, no less than four "Post Office" stamps. His Mauritius was the most valuable portion of the collection and was considered in 1922 to outweigh even the legendary holdings of Ferrary. H.M. King George V was invited to submit his "want list" when the collection was entrusted to G. J. Phillips for dispersal. After the Royal Collection had been supplied with the stamps requested, the rest was sold by Phillips in New York during 1923.





Major Edward Benjamin Evans (1846-1922)

Collector stationed at Mauritius, while serving as a Lieutenant (later Captain) in the Royal Artillery, from 1876-1879. Discovered Mauritian Colonial records pertaining to the origin of the 1847 "Post Office" issue and communicated this priceless information to European journals. Conducted a search of the island for a "Post Office" stamp and was eventually rewarded in the purchase of Edward Buger's collection, which included a 1d "Ball Invitation" envelope. Sold the envelope for £75. Later became editor of Gibbons' "Stamp Monthly". King George V bought his GB Mulready & Caricature collection.



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His Majesty King George V (1865-1936)

Began his passion for stamps as Prince of Wales. Bought several collections intact, including that of the Earl of Kintore, which had a 1d "Ball Invitation" envelope addressed to Duvivier. Created philatelic history by paying the then world record price of £1,450 for his unused 2d "Post Office" at Puttick & Simpson's London auction in 1904. He had a keen appreciation of quality and his Mauritius remains a much treasured part of the Royal Collection today.

Henry P. Manus (1851-1932)

Dutch collector who formed an important general collection including "Post Office" 1d on "Ball Invitation" envelope, and an unused 2d, which Peckitt had obtained from H. J. Duveen in a swap. In the Brussels 1923 exhibit Manus exhibited "hors concours" in addition to the Post Office stamps, twelve reconstructed plates of the Post Paids. Manus's collection was consigned for sale to Plumridge's in London, and was sold during 1932 and 1933.



Arthur Hind (1856-1933)

Wealthy Anglo-American industrialist. Sent Hugo Griebert as his agent to the Ferrary sales 1921 to 1925 and emerged the biggest buyer. Had a particular fascination for the Mauritius primitives, and bought intact the collections of H. J. Duveen and M. Bleirot. Hind always wanted to believe he had the "best", so much so, the story goes, that when H.M. George V showed him his marvellous "Post Office" 2d unused, Hind replied that he had a pair!

Most of his collection was sold by auction by Harmers who received it after it had been withdrawn from Charles Phillips even though the latter had produced

an impressive 368-page catalogue in 1934 during the depression. It included four "Post Office" Mauritius – the first and only other time both "Post Office" stamps were offered both unused and used. The 261 lots of Mauritius realised an incredible \$165,000. The balance of the collection was sold by his wife through Harmer, Rooke in 1935.

Charles Lathrop Pack (1857-1937)

Major Buyer at the Ferrary sales. Formed notable specialised studies of classic issues of the world. Collection sold by auction in New York during 1945.





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Alfred F. Lichtenstein (1876-1947)

Wealthy American collector who formed a grand general collection of notable quality. Sent Theodore Champion to buy for him at the Ferrary sales 1922-1925. Acquired the extensive collection of George H. Worthington. Died in 1947, but the collection was kept up by his daughter, Louise Boyd Dale. After her death, the bulk of the collection was sold by auction in 1968-1969. He had a very extensive collection of Mauritius, including the cover to Bombay with two 1d "Post Office" and a 2d used on part envelope. He also owned the unique unused 2d Sherwin pair in fine condition. The auction of the Mauritius section filled three sales over the period in which the cover to Bombay alone realised an impressive \$380,000 (1968).

Hans Lagerloef (1880-1951)

Fervent Swedish collector, acquiring most of his important stamps in the 1920s. Made a donation of most of his collection to the Swedish Postal Museum in Stockholm in 1926. His used 1d and 2d "Post Office" are the jewels of the Museum collection, each one spectacularly exhibited in a thick safe with press button lighting contained in an individual security-built showcase.





Theodore Champion (1873-1954)

One of the few important dealers who also had an extensive personal collection including many world rarities. He set up business in Paris in 1886 and his shop in Rue Drouot was "a Mecca" for the most important collectors at the time. He was publisher of the famous Yvert, Tellier & Champion catalogues and albums. His private collection included both the 1d and 2d "Post Office".

Alfred H. Caspary (1877-1955)

Began collecting seriously after the First World War. Was a major purchaser at the Ferrary sales 1921 to 1925 and acquired several important pieces from the H. J. Duveen collection through C. J. Phillips in New York. Had assembled a renowned world collection of exceptional quality and rarity by the time of his death in 1955, but had never had the fortune to possess a Mauritius "Post Office". He did, however, own several items of magnificent quality in the following issues. His collection was sold by auction during 1956 to 1958.





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Sir Ernest de Silva

Formed a notable collection of the early issues of the British Empire. Acquired a 1d "Post Office" unused at the Hind auction, which was sold at auction in 1957.

Maurice Burrus (1882-1959)

Alsatian tobacco magnate who assembled a very important collection of exceptional quality. Attended personally the Ferrary sales 1921 to 1925 and it has been said his was "the greatest all-world" collection ever achieved by one man. It exceeded in size and value that of Ferrary! Acquired during his lifetime almost all the notable rarities of the world, including five "Post Office" Mauritius. Died in 1959, most of his collection being sold by auction 1962-1964. The Mauritius section realised a staggering \$265,000.





Josiah K. Lilly (1893-1966)

Wealthy American industrialist who formed a vast collection of 250 volumes of all world, with emphasis on early rarities, particularly unused and blocks. The Mauritius section did not have either the 1d or 2d "Post Office", but he managed to acquire the unique 2d Sherwin unused in fine quality missing from most of the other great collections. At the second Lilly auction in 1967 a Post Paid 1d block of four realised \$64,000 and a 2d unused \$9,000.

Lars I. Amundsen

Notable collector of Norwegian origin who lived outside Geneva and formed an outstanding worldwide collection of mostly single stamps, but only in the very finest quality. He equally had some exceptional Mauritius but not any "Post Office" stamps. His collection was auctioned in the late 1960's.



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



Mrs. Louise Boyd Dale (1913-1967)

The daughter of Alfred Lichtenstein, she inherited his outstanding collections but was also a fine philatelist in her own right. She did not add any "Post Office" stamps but she did improve the sections on the Sherwin and Dardenne issues. The collection then known as "Dale-Lichtenstein" was auctioned after her death during 1968-1971.

Hiroyuki Kanai (1925-

Engineer-industrialist, Hiroyuki Kanai succeeded his father as President of more than ten companies in his home city of Osaka, Japan. He won the highly respected Japanese Medal of Honour from Emperor Hirohito. Already at the age of 13 he began a serious stamp collection assisted by his mother and his much-needed pocket-money. He founded two philatelic societies while at University.





In 1991 Kanai received the Blue Ribbon Medal of Honour from the Emperor, and it is both coincidental and appropriate that he has been elected to the Roll of Distinguished Philatelists in 1993 at the same moment of the auction of his Mauritius.



MAURITIUS at Auction 1921-1985


In September 1847 the first stamps of Mauritius were issued bearing the inscription "POST OFFICE" in the left tablet instead of the inscription "POST PAID", widely believed to have been an error by the engraver Joseph Osmond Barnard. However, Lady Gomm, wife of the Governor of Mauritius was thrilled at the idea of using the first postage stamps for the franking of envelopes containing invitations to the great Fancy Dress Ball she was preparing at Government House. There would not have been enough time to re-engrave the plate so the stamps had to be issued in spite of the error. ("... I'erreur la plus colossale et la plus célèbre de toute la philatélie", R. Brunel, 1928.)

There is much speculation today about whether this inscription was really an error. However, there is sufficient evidence to show that the stamps were almost immediately replaced after the single printing in September 1847 by stamps with the inscription "POST PAID". The small number of known examples are the only stamps in the world bearing the "POST OFFICE" inscription. It would appear that in spite of all the legends, that the wording simply followed that on the handstamps which had been used by the Mauritius Post Office for nearly ten years.

Of course the unique inscription and the story surrounding it were not the only contributions to the rarity and fame of these stamps. The first example was not discovered until 1864 and each following discovery was accompanied by great public enthusiasm.

The stories about each one and the commercial transactions surrounding them have been closely followed and recorded from the earliest times...

Though fame and fortune are not necessarily harmonious "bedfellows", they certainly were in the case of the Mauritius Post Office stamps. The One Penny Red and Two Pence Blue have continually commanded the highest prices. As early as 1893 Stanley Gibbons Ltd., the leading London dealers, had recognised the two Post Office stamps as the RAREST STAMPS OF THE WORLD which they had purchased for the HIGHEST PRICE EVER PAID FOR TWO STAMPS. In the same year a One Penny and Two Pence were the main items in a collection purchased for sixty thousand gold francs.

Their fame and fortune has consistently followed the same direction over the last decades. 1993 is exactly 100 years since that famous transaction and the next episode is about to be written...

The Legislative Council of the island passed Ordinance 13 on 17 December 1846, fixing, *inter alia*, the minimum rate of internal postage at 2d. a half-ounce for country letters and 1d. an ounce for local town delivery. Most of the new regulations came into force on New Year's Day 1847. Article 9 of the Ordinance is particularly interesting because it foreshadowed the use of postage stamps:

Every letter, newspaper or packet of any kind liable to postage under this Ordinance, if posted within the colony and its dependencies and having a stamp or stamps fixed thereto and appearing on the outside, such stamps being provided by the Government, and being of the value or amount required in each case according to the preceding tariff, and not having been used before, shall pass by the post free of postage.

Barnard's estimate is dated 12 November 1846 and is to be found reproduced in an Ordinance of 14 January 1847. The original was discovered in Mauritius by Major Edward Evans during his researches, while stationed on the island. That document, which is of exceptional philatelic interest, was presented by Evans in 1898 to the British Museum and is kept in the British Library:

No instructions or invitation to tender have been found; probably the details of what he was to perform were conveyed to Barnard in a conversation. No written acceptance of the estimate has been found nor even the date when Barnard was instructed to carry out his work.

It is so highly improbable as to be discounted that the design was left to him alone, and the presumption must be that someone in authority gave him instructions, detailed instructions, about what to engrave. According to the article by Adolphe and d'Unienville:

His instructions were that a profile to left of Queen Victoria with diadem should occupy the middle of each stamp, as it did on the English penny and two penny stamps

He chose a small copper plate, about 3 1/4 inches by 2 1/2 inches, such as might be used for printing a lady's visiting card, on which to engrave the design.

Although he had described himself in an advertisement in *Le Ceméen*, the local newspaper, for 9 March 1839 as a Miniature Painter and Engraver it seems that he had but little experience of engraving portraits, at any rate, miniature portraits; his attempts to copy the noble lines of the Heath's engraving of the Queen's head were, nevertheless, surprisingly successful. There is about the design a simple charm which has perhaps in no small measure contributed to the popularity of the Post Office Mauritius with collectors.

Barnard engraved the 1d. design in the north-west corner and the 2d. in the north-east corner of the small copper plate. No remarks have been called forth about the wording Postage, Mauritius, One Penny, and Post.

However, a whole romance has been built up about the other word, Office. There is no direct evidence to support the theory that inscribing Office was an error. The argument in favour of its being an error is based, au fond, on the early statements in the philatelic press that it was an error, and on the undoubted fact that, within eight months, a new issue was put on sale with the word PAID inscribed on both values in the place where on the first issue the word Office had appeared – moreover, there is no trace in the Mauritius archives of any reason for the change.

Joseph Osmond Barnard



Joseph Osmond Barnard born in Portsmouth, England 1816 arrived in Mauritius travelling as a stowaway in 1838. A year later he advertised himself as engraver, miniature painter and teacher in art and drawing. He married a young woman of Dutch origin in 1839 and purchased a sugar estate near Grand Port in 1862. He retired and died there in 1865 leaving as many as ten children. In 1991 a special stamp was issued showing his portrait behind the celebrated Two Pence Post Office Blue.

Dear Mr. Feldman,

Recently I heard that you will be offering the Kanai collection of Mauritius at auction later this year. Although a great deal has been written about this stamp, I may be able to add a romantic incident, without which some 13 of those in existence today might have been lost.

In 1847 an engineer named Adolphe Borchard, from Bordeaux, was sent by his company to Mauritius. Just before he left he had become engaged to a local girl. While on the island he constantly wrote love letters to his future bride. After his return, they were married and presumably lived a happy life.

Some years after his death, Mrs. Borchard read in a newspaper about a "find of one of the rare Mauritius stamps". She went to her desk, took out the bundle of her husbands letters from the island, removed the ribbon and looked. On 13 of the letters she found the stamp mentioned in the newspaper article. She promptly sold them. One of the innumerable write-ups of this story appeared in the "Berliner Illustrierte", the foremost weekly of the times, on March 9, 1939. I am enclosing a copy.

You will wonder why I bother to repeat a well known story to you. Here is my reason. Adolphe Borchard had a sister. The sister married a man from Hamburg, named H. Cohnheim. They had a son, whom they named Richard, who was my maternal grandfather. Richard may not have been a stamp collector, but his exceptional carreer has been well documented. At age 32 he became the first Director of Finance of the then fast growing Krupp Steel Co., in Essen, where my mother was born.

I hope that the above will add a little to your store-house of 'Mauritius History', and I wish you success at the auction.

One Penny and Two Pence Unused

According to the records, there have been nine collectors fortunate enough to own the unused One Penny red and Two Pence blue POST OFFICE stamps on different occasions during their collecting activities. However, only five of these nine have had BOTH stamps in their collections at the same time.

Today, the Kanai collection is the only one having both unused stamps. Several of the Post Office stamps exist today in Museums or State Collections including the British Museum, the Swedish Postal Museum, the collection of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II, etc.

This is the second time in philatelic history that both Post Office stamps unused and used (or used on cover) are offered in one auction sale. It is curiously enough, exactly one hundred years ago when the two unused stamps were last offered **together** on the philatelic market!



One Penny Unused

ONE PENNY orange-red, the brilliant unused example, of exceptionally fresh appearance, good margins practically all round, complete design and not cut into at any spot. The only small and unimportant imperfection is thinning in two places, one almost imperceptible and the other under the hinge at top. Certificate R.P.S.

Only two unused examples were ever recorded. The other example, according to Kanai, has been missing since the end of World War II. Whether lost in the war or still in some collection, nobody seems to know.

This example on offer has always been qualified as the best one extant. Even a letter from the Royal Philatelic Society in 1958 stated that "...This item is unquestionably the finer of the two recorded unused examples of the Penny Post Office Mauritius".

It is now believed that is the only unused One Penny Post Office Mauritius in existence.

Biography of the stamp

1869 The stamp was discovered by Madame Borchard of Bordeaux when going through correspondence from her fiancée stationed in Mauritius, in 1847.

1869 Madame Borchard sold it to a local dealer, Madame Desbois.

1870 E. Lalanne obtained the stamp from Madame Desbois for having helped her dispose of a lot of her stamps.

1893 Piet Lataudie bought Lalanne's collection for 60,000 gold francs through the agency of Marcel Pouget.

1893 Stanley Gibbons Ltd. bought the stamp together with the Twopence blue for £680, advertised as "The highest price ever paid for two stamps".

1893 Sir William B. Avery bought the stamp from Stanley Gibbons together with the Twopence blue for \$4,025.

1909 W. H. Peckitt bought Avery's collection for £24,500.

1909 Henry J. Duveen, the great New York antique dealer and uncle of the famous Joseph Duveen, bought the stamp from Peckitt, paying partly in cash and partly in exchange for other stamps.

1923 Arthur Hind bought the stamp through the agency of C. J. Phillips (Stanley Gibbons) along with some others for a price of about \$30,000.

1934 At the famous Hind auction sales the stamp was bought by Sir Ernest de Silva of Colombo.

1957 de Silva presented the stamp to Sir Cyril de Zoysa, J.P., U.M. of Colombo.

1957 Sir Cyril consigned the stamp to H.R. Harmer of London and as Lot 74 of their March 25th auction it sold for £4,500. It was bought jointly by Harry Nissen and W. E. Lea and the price was a British auction record for a single stamp at the time.

1958 Nissen and Lea sold the stamp to another London company headed by J. A. Franks and Peter Holcombe. The price was £6,500.

1958 Franks and Holcombe sold the stamp to a wealthy New York collector by the name of Gilbert. Gilbert was a passionate collector and though rich in his own right he preferred to rent valuable Old Master and Impressionist paintings, for periods up to 2 years, which he would place on his salon walls for all visitors to see. Rare and famous stamps, however, he bought outright. Then he would likewise frame each one individually and hang them on the walls in- between the paintings!

1962 Gilbert fell on hard times. Not only did his wife leave him but the shares of his quoted companies crashed on Wall Street Exchange on the day known as Black Friday. The stamp was taken by creditors in part payment of his debts.

1963 The stamp was lot 51 at the Harmer Rooke auction of March 21st. Harmer Rooke was the auction arm of Stanley Gibbons Ltd. at the time.



The tense scene as Mr. Webb calls for final bids for the "Post Office" Mauritius.

The newspaper report detailed the event "... It was displayed by Miss Moollan, a Mauritian student, and John Webb, the auctioneer, started the bidding at $\mathfrak{L}5,000$. Then, at high speed, the bids were signified amid growing excitement... $\mathfrak{L}5,250$... $\mathfrak{L}5,500$... $\mathfrak{L}5,750$... and in "steps" of $\mathfrak{L}250$ to $\mathfrak{L}8,000$! After one last despairing cry of " $\mathfrak{L}8,250$ ", the most precious of stamps was knocked down to a buyer from Japan for $\mathfrak{L}8,500$, the highest price ever paid for a single British Commonwealth stamp." It certainly exceeded the expectation of the Managing Director, A. L. Michael, who was later interviewed in the B.B.C. programme "Today" on news of the event...

The stamp was purchased by Hiroyuki Kanai,

1986 The stamp remained with Kanai for the next 23 years until he consigned his Mauritius collection together with the stamp to David Feldman, Geneva.

1988 The stamp was sold to the present owner for US\$850,000.

1993 The stamp is offered at the David Feldman auction sale of November 3.

TWO PENCE blue, the brilliant unused example of wonderfully fresh appearance and deep rich colour. The four margins are clear all round slightly touching at upper right but the stamp design is entirely clear and top left tablet is full. Noticeable on the reverse, there is a slight thin where it had been hinged. The finest and probably only example in private hands today. Certificate R.P.S.

Four examples of the unused Two Pence have been recorded. One is in the Royal Collection, a second in the British Museum (Library). A third example has not been seen for over 20 years and its current whereabouts are not known.

The blue stamp in particular exemplifies all the romance and fame of the Post Office issue. Popularly referred to as the "Blue Penny" in Mauritius itself, it is the subject of enormous tourist promotion even though no single example exists on the island. In the last few years many general public promotions have been made based on this stamp – for example a well known car manufacturer announced its new model "Mauritius Blue" and there is the widely popular family society game "Die Blau Mauritius".

The Proof taken from the original plate (2d at left, 1d at right) in the correct colours of indigo-blue and orange-red. Stout carton paper, together with ink samples for both colours together on similar carton paper. The former has been folded and rejoined as it was originally.

The light impressions of the designs illustrates the depth and fineness of the engraving, and highlights the difficulty Barnard must have had in mixing an ink of a consistency to print from all the recessed areas.

Later reprints from this plate are known in black, in deep orange (both designs) and in deep blue (both designs), known to have been done in 1912 (Royal Collection) and circa 1930 (Burrus collection).

The pair offered here is the only one known and should not be confused with the reprints mentioned above. This item is quite unique being the only surviving example of the printing of both stamps together in their original colours. It is also our opinion, taking account of the underinking and appearance of smudge impressions, that this item can be dated closer to the issue time.

This is obviously an important piece in telling the final and definitive story of the "Post Office" issue. Ex. Kanai

Printing Format:

Engraved on two copper plates (previously used to print advertisements of the Grand Hotel d'Europe, Port Louis) one for each value so that each contained four horizontal rows of three stamps. The twelve stamps on each plate were engraved individually so that each has differences in its engraving. This enables every stamp to be identified as originating from one of the twelve positions on its plate.

Date of Issue:

(May) 1853 for the One Penny.

June 1848 for the Two Pence.

Perforation:

Imperforate.

Paper:

Variable - Some of the types of paper used in earlier issues did not readily take the printing or cancellation inks. This gives rise to "sticky" prints or damage to the surface of the stamp where the cancellation ink flicked off carrying surface

fibres of the stamp with it.

Impressions:

Five states of impression of each value are recognised.

Summary of the Collection

The wealth of "Post Paid" material in the collection is clearly demonstrated when relating the individual items to the past history of these stamps and analysing it in relation to their provenance. Thus, of the "Earliest" and "Early" impressions (excluding the reconstructed plate) 44 of the 60 pieces have been identified as coming from one or more of the past great named sales of Mauritius "Primitives" referred to in the introduction section of this catalogue. Many of the others have provenances from the "less renowned" sales.

Highlights of the collection are summarised below where attention is drawn to the rare, unique and otherwise specially sought after items. In total there are 34 items from the Earliest impression and 51 items from the Early impression.



The Bordeaux Cover

Discovery of the cover

(Copy of the story as told in Encyclopaedia of Rare and Famous Stamps by L. Norman Williams.)

"At the beginning of the century M. Lemaire published a series of articles dealing with Post Office stamps in the columns of his journal, *Le Philatéliste Français*. The articles were read avidly by a French schoolboy who, although he could never hope to own such rarities, was keenly interested in the romantic stories of the latest discoveries. He spoke about the stamps to his mother, widow of a businessman of Bordeaux. She, her interest kindled by her son's enthusiasm, recalled some of her husband's early dealings with Mauritius and told the boy that there might be some old letters from Mauritius in the correspondence files of the firm.

Many weary and dusty days the boy spent in turning over piles of musty papers. It is true that for his labours he was rewarded with finding some old stamps, but there were none among them of notable rarity. The spark of enthusiasm although dimmed, continued to burn, and as he came to the last few bundles of letters there were revealed to his delighted gaze two letter-sheets bearing between them three of the classic rarities.

One of these was a veritable king among princes. It bore the two values, and the postal markings traced the history of the letter from the time when it left the island until its delivery... This letter is unique, in that it is only one known bearing the two values of the Post Office stamps, and it provides an excellent example of the way in which interest of stamps is heightened when they are on cover."

[&]quot;Over 55 years ago, as a very young collector, I had three ambitions – to obtain a diamond shaped "Tannu-Touva", easily accomplished with one's pocket money; to own a Penny Black, which took a little longer to realise; and to see a Post Office Mauritius. This took much longer, almost twenty five years until I was fortunate enough to have a hand in the acquisition of the 1d orange-red unused, which now resides in this famous collection. But Hiroyuki Kanai, a name synonymous with Mauritius Classics "pipped me". He became the owner of not only the 1d and 2d unused, but a cover to France bearing both the 1d and 2d – the Orb and Sceptre of Philately, a true "Gem of Gems", and a feat which only a few "mortals" have been allowed – the French schoolboy, Lemaire, Lichtenstein, Hind, Burrus and Kanai, all attained "Philatelic Immortality" through this cover. Now it is to change hands again, to yet another "mortal" who will cherish it as no other possession until his or her time comes to eventually pass it on to another – such is the lure of Philately."

The Bordeaux Cover

The famous and unique cover bearing both One Penny orange-red and Two Pence deep blue.

Both stamps are of deep rich and fresh colour, with good to adequate margins all sides (including underinked upper left corner of 2d). Some trivial imperfections do not in any way impeach on the stunning aspect of this incomparable item.

The stamps are both neatly cancelled with the framed black PENNY POST and are also tied to the cover, which is also very fine, by the red Boulogne circular date stamp of December 26, 1847, applied on arrival in France.

The cover is in fact an entire including the letter contents. It has ms "via England" at top left and boxed COLONIES/& ART. 13. with rate marking. On reverse the cover bears the following markings: MAURITIUS POST OFFICE/OC 04 1847, framed SHIP LETTER/PLYMOUTH, red PARIS cds of December 26, 1847 and BORDEAUX arrival of December 28, 1847.

The letter included was written in Port Louis on October 4, 1847 by Edward Francis & Co. and was addressed to Duncan & Lurgnie at Bordeaux confirming the sale of 30 of the 48 casks of wine received earlier. The cover passed through the Mauritius Post Office on October 4 and was carried by private ship to England, landing at Plymouth. It was passed to London, then to Paris before reaching its final destination in Bordeaux, taking altogether 86 days, which was normal at that time.

The three pence franking paid the local Port Louis Penny Post service of one penny and two pence for transfer to foreign mail. The red Boulogne cds is the unique proof and external witness that the Post Office stamps were used and paid postage. No other Post Office stamps are tied other than with local handstamps. It is also the only cover bearing both stamps.

This cover is therefore in every way the fundamental and key item of the Post Office issue.

The Bordeaux Cover

Biography of the cover

1847 The cover was mailed from Port Louis and received in December of that year by Duncan & Lurgnie, Bordeaux wine merchants. It remained in their files for another 55 years.

1902 A French schoolboy discovered the cover when searching through the firm's old correspondence.

1903 Th. Lemaire bought the cover for £1,600.

1903 Brunet de l'Argentière bought the cover from Lemaire for £1,800.

1917 Alfred Lichtenstein acquired the cover when he purchased the Argentière collection.

1922 Arthur Hind bought the cover for £7,500.

1934 At the famous Hind sale, Edgar Mohrmann bought the cover for £5,000 and later sold it to Maurice Burrus who was then forming one of the greatest collections of Mauritius. Though the price was in fact lower than that which Hind had paid twelve years earlier it must be appreciated that the times were much different and this was now in the middle of the depression years.

1963 At the famous Burrus auction sale Raymond H. Weill Co. bought the cover for £28,000 and later sold it to a client.

1968 The cover once again changed hands, each time at a higher price though the actual figures have not been disclosed.

1968 Raymond H. Weill Co. bought back the cover once again.

1971 Hiroyuki Kanai purchased the cover for 120 millions Japanese yen (over US\$1 million). This was by far the highest price ever paid for a philatelic item at that time.

The famous cover remained in the Kanai collection for the next 25 years. He exhibited it in his peerless collection of Mauritius, acclaimed to be the greatest collection of Mauritius ever assembled.

1986 The cover was consigned to David Feldman, Geneva.

1988 The present owner purchased the cover from David Feldman for US\$3.8 millions. Again this was by far the highest price ever paid for a philatelic item and this record is still held today.

1993 The cover is offered at the David Feldman auction sale November 3.

Illustration of the backside of the cover.

There was no Post Office regular service available in 1847. The cover was carried on the private ship service via the Cape and on arrival at the first British port, i.e. Plymouth, the respective SHIP LETTER handstamp was applied. The British Post Office applied the COLONIES & ART. 13 handstamp, being the convention under which this mail was treated, before passing the letter to the French Post Office at Boulogne. The red Boulogne datestamp of December 26 1847 was applied on the arrival there, most fortunately over both stamps and thus tying them again to the cover.

The French Post Office charged 20 décimes for the total due for sea, British and French postage.

The cover is signed by Roger Calves, Raymond Weill Co., and in pencil by David Feldman, David MacDonnell (on reverse), and Renato Mondolfo (interior).



MAURITIUS The "Lapirot" Issue

Re Engraving:

By October 1859 the plate had been sufficiently worn for it to be re-engraved

by a person or persons unknown, to produce a "Retouched" plate.

Date of Original Issue:

March 1859.

Date of Re-Engraving:

Before 9th November 1859.

Perforation:

Imperforate.

Paper:

Variable (very delicate).

Impressions:

Three states of impression are recognised plus the addition of the "Re-

touched" impression.

Summary of the Collection

The collection contains several unique pieces, the outstanding items being the unique block of four, the only known examples of the "Retouched" plate and a cover bearing a Lapirot, a Penny Post Paid and a Britannia.



Fresh colours and in remarkably good state of preservation for such an extraordinary combination of issues. All stamps with clear to good four margins and fine to very fine. It is amazing that someone should have made the one shilling rate from these three different issues though it was just around that moment, beginning May 1859, when these three stamps would have been available at the same time!

Kanai illustrates the cover in "Classic Mauritius" (page 83) and has described it as "probably the only known cover bearing three different issues". It is certainly a unique triple franking cover and one of the gems of the Kanai collection.

(Kanai notes only seven Lapirot Early Impression covers but only about three are in good condition. This lot being one of the three is the only Early Impression cover in his collection.)



Rudge says "I have examined all four of these stamps presented as two pairs in the following two lots, the former being on cover. Although they are very different from all other Lapirot impressions, there are some features which confirm they are derived from the original plate and therefore a genuine retouch.

Because they are so different from the "normal" Lapirot, I feel there may be other genuine stamp retouched stamps languishing perhaps in collections of forgeries or perhaps have been destroyed because one thought they were probably forgeries.

In any case, as far as I know, the only examples existing of the Retouched Plate are those two pairs offered in the following two lots."

MAURITIUS The "Sherwin" Issue

Denomination:

Two Pence (a One Penny was prepared but never postally used).

Engraver and printer:

It is uncertain who actually engraved the copper plates but the available evidence suggests that it was commenced by Robert Sherwin and completed by another at Port Louis, Mauritius. It is not known who printed the stamps.

Printing Format:

The "Post Paid" plates became too worn for further use and were re-engraved for the "Sherwin" issue. It was done so effectively that no feature of the "Post Paid" engraving was afterwards discernible on the plates. The individual engraving almost exactly coincides with the position previously occupied by the "Post Paid". Both the "Sherwin" plates survive, although scored to prevent their further use, in the Archives of the Royal Philatelic Society, London. Differences in the engraving enable every stamp to be identified as originating from one of the twelve positions on the plate.



TWO PENCE UNUSED

Unused this stamp has been missing from almost every important collection throughout the century. After extensive research we can confirm that only THREE (FOUR?) single examples and ONE PAIR have ever been recorded unused. It is therefore as rare as the 2d Post Office and its catalogue quotation is derisory.



Denomination: One Penny and Two Pence.

Engraver: Louis Adolphe Dardenne at Port Louis, Mauritius.

Printing Format: Lithographic stone of unknown size, and therefore the number of stamps printed on a

sheet is unknown. It is thought that the printing stone consisted of two transfers of the intermediate stone, and that each printing may have consisted of 60 or 72 stamps.

Date of Issue: December 1859 (30,000 One Penny and 40,000 Two Pence stamps were in stock

on 12 December 1859).

Perforation: Imperforate.

Paper: White or yellowish laid paper. A watermark is known, but of unknown design; part of it

is found only rarely on individual stamps (several examples here).

Summary of the Collection

This collection of Dardenne stamps is of outstanding quality and significance, with many unique items making it the most comprehensive in existence. In historical terms the only near rival to this collection was that belonging to Dale and Lichtenstein. Of the 101 "Dardenne" items included in the present sale, 56 are from that collection.

Multiples of the Two Pence

If it is accepted that the only method of reconstructing a Dardenne sheet is by the assembly of an overlapping mosaic of interconnecting multiples, then it does appear that sufficient material exists for the Two Pence value to be so plated, for an examination of the catalogues of major sales of Mauritius stamps, from Ferrary in 1921 to date, reveals that 39 of these sources included multiples of the Two Pence. The following summarises the findings:

35 of these pairs are on offer in the present sale, together with the only known strip of three, and one of the two known strips of four. The other strip of four (not recognised by Kanai in *Classic Mauritius*) was photographed by Lees-Jones, and is believed to have been sold in Switzerland in November 1953.

Flaws, Retouches and Varieties

The One Penny and the Two Pence both exhibit abnormalities, the collection of which is usually concentrated on the latter, where they are more marked and numerous than in the One Penny, and are of value to those who attempt to plate this issue.

The major, minor retouches and "Feather" variety are constant and are dealt with in detail in the Supplement of this catalogue.

Unused

An examination of catalogues of major sales and collections referred to earlier identified 29 unused examples of the One Penny, and 14 of the Two Pence, which are believed to be the total number of unused examples in existence. Of these, a few have features worth noting:

Unused examples of both Dardenne values are seldom available as only nine examples of the One Penny and eight of the Two Pence have been identified as being in sales recorded since 1921. Exceptionally on offer in this collection are three unused One Penny examples (Lots 216, 217 and 278) and two unused Two Pence (Lots 273 and 278).

Multiples of the One Penny off cover

A high proportion of the known major multiples are in this collection. The "off cover" examples include the unique block of four on piece (Lot 224), a vertical strip of four (Lot 227), and a horizontal strip of four (Lot 226). Three vertical pairs (Lots 218, 229 and 278), a vertical strip showing $2\frac{1}{2}$ stamps (Lot 230), and a horizontal pair (Lot 228).

Covers

The covers represented in this collection are the major Dardenne pieces presently in existence. All are unique or very rare.

Unique One Penny items are: A cover to Paris dated 6 February 1861 with two vertical strips of four stamps (Lot 221).

A cover to Granville, France, dated 6 February 1860 with a horizontal strip of three (Lot 223).

A printed circular bearing a pair, also dated 6 February 1860 (Lot 222).

A cover bearing both One Penny and Two Pence (one of two known) to Bordeaux dated 7 February 1860 (Lot 272).

A cover bearing a Two Pence Dardenne and a 4d. Britannia imperforate (which replaced the Dardennes) to Marseilles dated 19 November 1860 (Lot 250).

A cover bearing a pair of the Two Pence to Calcutta dated 8 February 1860 (Lot 278).

Two covers, each bearing a pair of the Two Pence to France, both dated 8 March 1860 (Lots 243 and 244).

One cover with the "major retouch to neck" Two Pence to Bordeaux dated 23 September 1860 (Lot 267).

About twenty covers with the Two Pence value are known, although not all are now in existence (e.g. Lot 109 in the Dale and Lichtenstein sale of 1968, and Lot 154 in their 1970 sale, no longer exist as the stamps were removed and two of the three pairs (Lots 453 and 460) now form part of Kanai's plating on pages 121 and 122 of *Classic Mauritius*, while the third pair shows the "minor" retouch to neck (Lot 270).

Cancellations

The majority of used stamps in this collection have been cancelled with an oval of bars, a few with PAID in a circle, and others with a target cancel. Two cancellations on offer are rare, namely a One Penny cancelled by a 4 in two concentric circles (Pamplemousses) (Lot 234), and a pair of the Two Pence cancelled with an Indian receiving mark B102 (Kedgeree) (Lot 253).



MAURITIUS 1847 "Post Office" Issue

One Penny Ball Invitation Envelope

Joseph Osborne Barnard submitted an estimate on November 12, 1846 to the postal authorities for the production of "letter labels" (now in the British Museum collection). On February 8, 1847 Colonial Postmaster J. S. Brownrigg included the matter in a memorandum to Governor Gomm. Sir William Gomm, who had fought the battle of Waterloo, showed particular interest in the development of mail services both inland and abroad until his retirement in 1849. On September 20, 1847 Brownrigg reported to the Governor that the stamps were now ready for distribution and it became clear they were officially issued the following day, September 21, 1847.

At that time preparations were in full swing for a very special Fancy Dress Ball to be held at Government House on September 30, 1847. It was envisaged that this occasion would present a fine opportunity for the island's French and English speaking communities to reconcile their differences and so the Ball is specifically chronicled in the history of the Colony.

Lady Gomm had been busy drawing up the invitation list and was attracted to the idea of using these new invented "letter labels" to make a colourful and distinguished franking for the envelopes containing the invitations, even moreso as the stamp bore the effigy of the British Queen Victoria. Though it is presumed that the invitations must have been sent throughout the island which would require two pence postage outside of Port Louis, we only have record of the One Penny stamp being used to pay the correct postage on locally delivered envelopes.

What was amazing was the use of these stamps on their very first day of issue, as such alone a very important philatelic event for the world's fourth postage stamp. Only three such envelopes have been recorded, two dated September 21 and the third September 27. One is in the British Museum (Library). The second one now in the Royal Collection had been previously purchased by W. H. Peckitt of London for £600 in 1898. The large sum of money paid to the owner caused a stir in the island and prompted others to search through their papers.

Henry Adam, an elderly member of the Government Council of Mauritius, well remembered having attended Lady Gomm's fancy dress ball, and was quite sure that somewhere in his papers there was a souvenir of the event. He spent many hours looking through some fifty years' accumulation of documents, and eventually was rewarded by finding the original envelope addressed to H. Adam Esq Junr. and bearing a One Penny Post Office stamp. In fact, this is the only envelope of the three showing the stamp cancelled with the correct Port Louis PAID in frame handstamp for local delivery.

One Penny red-orange, a brilliant example with completely clear four margins. The stamp shows the undisputable characteristics of this first primitive printing, the ink being applied in thick units thus leaving some sections of the design underinked.

The stamp is tied by black framed PAID handstamp to small Ball Invitation envelope. Aside at top left of the envelope there is a good strike on the black framed PENNY POST local handstamp. On reverse the black circular datestamp MAURITIUS POST OFFICE/SE 27 1847.

The envelope is addressed to H. Adam Esq Jnr. who recalled some fifty years later having attended the Fancy Dress Ball and having receiving the invitation inside this envelope.

Biography of the Cover

1847 Henry Adam, Member of the Mauritius Government Council, received the cover containing an invitation to Lady Gomm's ball at Government House.

1899 Th. Lemaire bought the cover from Adam for $\mathfrak{L}680$.

1899 W. H. Peckitt bought the cover from Lemaire for £800.

1899 Henry Duveen, the great antique dealer of New York, bought the cover from Peckitt for his personal collection, paying the sum of £1,080.

1909 In an exchange deal with Duveen, Peckitt again got possession of the cover for which he gave two other Post Office stamps.

1909 Peckitt sold the cover to H. P. Manus for an undisclosed sum.

1933 At the Manus auction sale by Plumridge & Co. of London, the cover was purchased by T. Allen for £2,100 which was a record of the time and an amazing price in the middle of the depression years.

1934(?) Allen sold the cover to King Carol of Romania.

1950 After the war the exiled king under hard times was obliged to sell the cover. It was the prize item in a lot of great world rarities belonging to the king, including the famous Tre Skilling Yellow of Sweden. The lot was sold to René Berlingen of Liechtenstein. The transaction was made through the agency of Harmer Rooke & Co. of London.

1971 In turn Berlingen suffered financial difficulties and decided to part with the cover. He consigned it to Stanley Gibbons Ltd. who offered it in their famous Anphilex auction in New York. It realised \$174,000 and went into the collection of Hiroyuki Kanai.

1986 The cover remained with Kanai for 15 years until he consigned his Mauritius collection including the Ball envelope to David Feldman, Geneva.

1988 The cover was sold to the present owner for US\$1.4 millions.

1993 The cover is offered at the David Feldman auction sale of November 3.

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
